Installation Overview

Follow the instructions in this chapter to install your Intel[®] PRO/100 Mobile adapter and associated network and modem cables. Then proceed to the software installation chapter for your operating system environment, as follows:

NOTE: For information on DOS and 32-bit ODI installation and troubleshooting, and supplementary information for other operating systems, see the Help file CB2HELP.HLP on the Intel CD.

The PRO/100 Mobile adapters provide access to both 10 Mbps and 100 Mbps networks with a single adapter cable, and auto-negotiates 10 Mbps or 100 Mbps network speed.

NOTE: Category 5 (data grade) unshielded twisted pair (UTP) cabling is required for 100Mbps. Category 3 or 5 can be used for 10Mbps.

Before Installing Hardware

Verify Other Required Equipment

To install the PRO/100 Mobile adapter, you need the following:

- 1 Type II adapters require a portable PC with a CardBus slot. Type III adapters require two slots, stacked on each other; the bottom slot must be CardBus compatible; or a Type III CardBus slot.
- 2 A local area network supporting 10 or 100Mbps Ethernet, as required, and a network operating system supported by the PRO/ 100 Mobile adapter.

NOTE: Since the PRO/100 Mobile adapter automatically detects the speed of the network to which it is connected, it may be safely connected to either a 100Base-TX or 10Base-T network, as specified in items 3 and 4 below.

- 3 For connection to a 100Base-TX 100Mbps Ethernet network, you need a Category 5 (data grade) unshielded twisted pair (UTP) network cable terminating in a male RJ-45 connector and connected to a 100Mbps hub or switch.
- 4 For connection to a 10Base-T twisted pair Ethernet network, you need a category 3 or 5 UTP network cable terminating in a male RJ-45 connector and connected to a 10Mbps hub or switch.
- 5 For modem operations: an analog telephone line, RJ-11 modular telephone cable (supplied), and if needed, an RJ-11 adapter for the local telephone system. Communications software is also required for modem and fax operations.

CAUTION: Do not connect to a digital telephone line or digital PBX system. In case of inadvertent connection to a digital line, special circuitry protects your modem.

Determine System Requirements

During installation of the PRO/100 Mobile adapter hardware, the computer should be ON and your standard operating software should be loaded (except Windows NT 4.0 computers. See chapter 3 for details). If configured to do so, your system will detect the PRO/100 Mobile adapter. For details on how to install driver software, see the chapter for your operating system environment.

NOTE: The PRO/100 Mobile adapter hardware is compatible with Types II and III PC Card slots that support CardBus technology. Installation and removal procedures may vary on different computers.

Installing the Type II Hardware

NOTE: Windows 95 and Windows 98 Users: Before proceeding with the following instructions, make sure your laptop is on and that Windows is running.

Connecting the Modem Cable (Combo adapter only)

• Attach the 26-pin connector at the end of the Intel modem cable to the matching receptacle on the **right side** of the PRO/100 Combo adapter. Press the connector gently into the receptacle on the card until it's firmly in place. Do not force the connection.



Connecting the LAN Adapter Cable (LAN-only adapter and Combo adapter)

• Attach the 15-pin connector at the end of the Intel adapter cable to the **left** connector on the end of the PRO/100 Mobile adapter. Press the cable connector gently into the connector on the card until it stops. Do not force the connection.



Attach the Ethernet LAN cable to the adapter cable

Attach your twisted pair LAN cable to the adapter LAN cable.



Attach the Phone line to the Modem connector (Combo Combo adapters only)

Attach your analog phone line to the RJ-11 connector on the Modem connector. Examine the icons on the cables to ensure correct placement. Take care not to insert the phone line into the LAN connector.



Insert the PRO/100 Mobile Adapter

- 1 Grasp the adapter by the edges with the Intel label facing upward and the wide connector next to the insert slot.
- 2 Insert the card into a CardBus slot and push it in until it is firmly seated.



NOTE: The PRO/100 Mobile adapter can only be used in CardBus-compliant PC Card slots.

Windows 98 Users: When you insert the PRO/100 Mobile adapter into a CardBus slot, Windows 98 automatically display the New Hardware Found window and starts the wizard.

Disconnecting Modem Cable from the Adapter

• Grasp the small connector with the thumb and forefinger and gently pull it free of the card.

Disconnecting Adapter Cable from the Card

• Pull the small connector with the thumb and forefinger to free the adapter cable from the card.

CAUTION: The PRO/100 Combo adapter will not work with digital telephone lines or digital PBX systems. Special circuitry protects your modem against damage from inadvertent connection to a digital line.

Installing the Type III Hardware

NOTE: Windows 95 and Windows 98 Users: Before proceeding with the following instructions, make sure your laptop is on and that Windows is running.

Connecting the LAN and Modem Cables (Combo adapter only)

Attach your phone line and LAN cable to the adapter as shown below. Use the icons on the bottom of the adapter to correctly identify each jack. Take care not to attach the phone line to the LAN connector. Fully insert the adapter into a Type III slot or the bottom slot in a pair of Type II CardBus slots.



Note: connecting the telephone is optional.

Cell Phone/Data Port Jack

The Type III adapter can attach to selected cellular phones or devices. This requires a special cable. For a list of compatible cell phone models and cable accessories, visit

PRO/100 LAN-only card (Type III)

Attach your LAN cable to the adapter as shown in the diagram below. Fully insert the adapter into a Type III slot or the bottom slot in a pair of Type II CardBus slots.



Making Floppy Disks

To make a floppy disk for driver installation, use the MAKEDISK utility. Place a formatted floppy disk in your drive. Go to the \MAKEDISK folder on the Intel CD. At the command line type:

MAKEDISK [operating system] [destination]

where [operating system] is the type of operating system (OS) which needs the diskette and [destination] is the drive letter.

OS options are:

NT = Windows NT W9X = Windows 95 or 98 W2K = Windows 2000 NW = NetWare servers and clients DOS = MS-DOS, Windows 3.1, OS/2 MODEM=Modem drivers for the PRO/100 Combo adapters (all versions of Windows)

Example:

MAKEDISK NT A: <Enter>

Intel Network Encryption Co-Processor

The Intel PRO/100 S Family of Network Adapters include an Intel 82594ED IPSec encryption co-processor. If Windows 2000 is enabled for IPSec encryption, it automatically offloads the intensive encryption and authentication functions onto the adapter, increasing throughput and decreasing CPU utilization.

Windows Me, 98, and 95 Installation

Plug and Play Installation

Most CardBus-enabled computers support plug and play installation of the PRO/100 Mobile adapters under Windows 98 and Windows 95, OSR2. However, early versions of Windows 95 (950 or 950a) are not supported.

LAN Drivers Available

The following drivers for Windows 98 and Windows 95 OSR2 are supplied with the PRO/100 Mobile adapters:

- NDIS4 driver (E100BNT.SYS)
- NDIS5 driver (E100BNT5.SYS)

The best NDIS driver for your operating system will be installed by default using the procedures described in this chapter.

Novell Client 32 Driver

If your environment requires the Novell client 32 driver under Windows 98/95 (as indicated by your network administrator), see the Windows Help file **CB2HELP.HLP** and Netware.txt on the Intel CD.

Windows Me - Type II adapters

This Windows version was not fully released at the time the Intel CD was finalized. The drivers on this CD have been tested with "Release Candidate" versions of Windows Me.

To install drivers in Windows Me, use the following procedure:

- 1 With computer power on, insert your new adapter as described in Chapter 1.
- 2 Connect the network cable and modem cable if it is a combo card.
- 3 Windows Me starts and detects the adapter. A default Windows LAN driver installs first and then the default modem driver. Although these drivers provide basic functionality, you'll need to update them with the drivers on the Intel CD. To update the drivers, continue this procedure.
- 4 Right-click the My Computer Icon on the desktop and click Prop-

erties. Click the Device Manager Tab. This displays a list of devices.

- 5 Find the Network adapters icon and expand if necessary. Select the Intel PRO/100 adapter and click Properties. Click the Driver Tab. The driver date of 10/23/99 is shown. Click Update Driver.
- 6 Insert your Intel CD into your drive and wait a few moments for it to spin up. The "Update Device Driver Wizard" starts. Select Automatic Search and click Next to continue.
- 7 After a few moments, the wizard displays the LAN driver on the Intel CD and automatically installs it. Click Finish.
- 8 Restart your computer when prompted.
- 9 Repeat steps 4 7 for the Modem. In the Device Manager, expand the Modem listing and choose the Intel PRO/100 Mobile Combo adapter.
- 10 Restart your computer when prompted.
- 11 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

See the "Installing Intel PROSet II" later in this chapter to install PROSet and other advanced features using the Intel Setup utility.

For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.

Windows Me - Type III Adapters

This Windows version was not fully released at the time the Intel CD was finalized. The drivers on this CD have been tested with "Release Candidate" versions of Windows Me.

To install drivers in Windows Me, use the following procedure:

- 1 With computer power on, insert your new adapter as described in Chapter 1.
- 2 Connect the network cable and modem cable if it is a combo card.
- 3 Windows Me detects the adapter. The Add New Hardware Wizard starts. Follow the prompts in the wizard to install the drivers from the Intel CD.
- 4 Restart your computer when prompted
- 5 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel

Mobile program group.

See the "Installing Intel PROSet II" later in this chapter to install PROSet and other advanced features using the Intel Setup utility.

For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.

Windows 98 - Type II Adapters

Note: for Windows 98 Second Edition, see the next section in this chapter. To check your version of Windows 98, right-click the My Computer icon and then select Properties. The Windows 98 version is displayed on this screen. If you do not see the words "Second Edition" then you are running the original version of Windows 98.

- 1 With Windows running, insert the PRO/100 Mobile adapter into the CardBus slot and connect cables as shown in Hardware Installation.
- 2 Windows detects the adapter (PCI Ethernet Controller) and displays the Add New Hardware Wizard. Click Next to continue. In this procedure, the LAN driver will be installed first and then the modem driver (if you have the PRO/100 Combo adapter). If the New Hardware Found window does NOT appear, you may need to enable CardBus support in your mobile computer's BIOS. See your computer's manual for information.
- 3 On the next screen, Windows prompts for a driver search. Choose "Search for the best driver (Recommended)" and click Next.
- 4 Insert the Intel CD or floppy disk and select the corresponding checkbox. Click Next to continue. If necessary, specify the path to your CD-ROM or floppy drive.

Note: When you insert the Intel CD to install drivers, an autorun file displays an introductory screen with several buttons. This is not part of the installation process, and you may close it or leave it open for later reading.

- 5 The new dialog displays the name of the adapter, depending on the product you are installing. Choose "The updated driver (Recommended)." Click Next.
- 6 Windows confirms the device name and location of the LAN driver (NET82557.INF). Click Next to continue. Windows may prompt you for the location of Windows networking files. Usually these are located in C:\windows\options\cabs or on your Windows 98 installation CD.

- 7 A message confirming successful LAN driver installation appears. Click Finish.
- 8 If you have the LAN only adapter, restart your computer when prompted and proceed to step 11.

If you have the Combo adapter, do not restart your computer yet. When prompted to do so, click No and proceed to step 9.

- 9 Windows detects the modem portion of the adapter (PCI Serial Controller) and repeats the wizard process above for the modem (driver name is MDME100B.INF). At the end of this process, a small dialog appears stating "Your card has been successfully configured." Click OK to close this dialog.
- 10 If the New Hardware Found wizard is present, click Finish.
- 11 For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.
- 12 Restart the computer to complete installation.
- 13 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

Windows 98 - Type III Adapters

- 1 With computer power on, insert your new adapter as described in Chapter 1.
- 2 Connect the network cable and modem cable if it is a combo card.
- 3 Windows detects the adapter. The Add New Hardware Wizard starts. Follow the prompts in the wizard to install the drivers from the Intel CD.
- 4 Restart your computer when prompted
- 5 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

See the "Installing Intel PROSet II" later in this chapter to install PROSet and other advanced features using the Intel Setup utility.

For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.

Windows 98 Second Edition (SE) - Type II Adapters

Note: if your laptop computer does not have a CD-ROM drive, see "Making a Floppy Disk."

Note: When you insert the Intel CD to install drivers, an autorun file displays an introductory screen with several buttons. This is not part of the installation process, and you may close it or leave it open for later reading.

- 1 With Windows running, insert the PRO/100 Mobile adapter into the CardBus slot and connect cables as shown in Hardware Installation.
- 2 In this procedure, a default Windows LAN driver will be installed first and then the modem driver (if you have the PRO/100 Combo adapter). Windows detects the adapter (PCI Ethernet Controller) and installs a resident driver for the LAN portion of the adapter. Later in this installation procedure, you'll need to update the default LAN driver.
- 3 Windows detects the modem portion of the adapter (PCI Serial Controller) and starts the Add New Hardware Wizard for the modem driver (driver name is MDME100B.INF). Click Next to proceed.
- 4 Select "Search for the best driver..." on this screen and click Next. Insert your Intel CD or Floppy. Click the CD-ROM drive box or Floppy drive box depending on the media your Intel drivers are on. Wait a few moments while the CD spins up. Click Next to proceed. The wizard displays the adapter name and driver name. Click Next to proceed.
- 5 The driver is copied and a dialog appears telling you that your card has been successfully configured. Click OK to close this diaglog. A reboot message appears. Click OK to close. Click Finish to close the hardware wizard and then restart your computer.

Note: if the Intel CD autorun screen appears, close it before restarting.

- 6 Now you need to update the default Windows LAN driver with the newer version on the Intel CD. Right-click the My Computer icon on your desktop. Click Properties. Click the Device Manager tab. You'll see a list of hardware devices. Under Network Adapters, select the Intel PRO/100 Mobile adapter (or combo adapter). Click Properties.
- 7 In the Properties window, click the Driver tab. On this screen

you'll see a driver dated 4-23-99. This is the old driver that comes with Windows SE. Click Update Driver. This starts the Update Device Driver Wizard.

- 8 Click Next to proceed. On the next screen select "Display a list of all the drivers..." and click Next. The Select Device window appears. Click the Have Disk button. Make sure your Intel CD or floppy is still in the drive. You may need to type the path to your CD-ROM drive.
- 9 On the refreshed Select Device window, pick the Intel driver dated 6-9-2000 or later and click OK.
- 10 The adapter name and driver name are displayed. Click Next to proceed.
- 11 Several files are copied from the Intel CD to your computer's hard drive. Click Finish to proceed.
- 12 Restart your computer when prompted by clicking Yes.
- 13 For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.
- 14 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

Windows 98 Second Edition (SE) - Type III Adapters

Note: if your laptop computer does not have a CD-ROM drive, see "Making a Floppy Disk."

Note: When you insert the Intel CD to install drivers, an autorun file displays an introductory screen with several buttons. This is not part of the installation process, and you may close it or leave it open for later reading.

To install drivers, use the following procedure:

- 1 With computer power on, insert your new adapter as described in Chapter 1.
- 2 Connect the network cable and modem cable if it is a combo card.
- 3 Windows detects the adapter. The Add New Hardware Wizard starts. Follow the prompts in the wizard to install the drivers from the Intel CD.
- 4 Restart your computer when prompted

5 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

See the "Installing Intel PROSet II" later in this chapter to install PROSet and other advanced features using the Intel Setup utility.

For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.

Windows 95 OSR2

Note: if your laptop computer does not have a CD-ROM drive, see "Making a Floppy Disk."

Note: When you insert the Intel CD to install drivers, an autorun file displays an introductory screen with several buttons. This is not part of the installation process, and you may close it or leave it open for later reading.

This procedure covers Windows 95 OSR2 (4.00.950B or later) only. If you are running the original retail version of Windows 95 (4.00.950) see the MOBILE.TXT file on the Intel CD.

- 1 With Windows running, insert the PRO/100 Mobile adapter into the CardBus slot and connect cables as shown above.
- 2 Windows detects a PCI Ethernet controller and displays the Update Device Driver Wizard. In this procedure, the LAN driver will be installed first and then the modem driver. Insert the Intel CD and click Next to start the procedure. (If the New Hardware Found window does NOT appear, you may need to enable Card-Bus support in your computer BIOS. See your computer's manual for information or check their website.)
- 3 Windows confirms the device name. Click Finish. This installs the LAN driver. If prompted for the NET82557.INF file, change the path back to your Intel CD. Windows may also ask you for the location of Windows networking files. Usually these are located in C:\windows\options\cabs or on your Windows 95 installation CD.
- 4 If prompted to restart, click Yes if you have the PRO/100 LAN only adapter and proceed to step 6.

Click No if you have the PRO/100 Combo adapter and proceed to step 5.

5 Windows detects the modem portion of the adapter (PCI Serial

Controller) and repeats the process above for the modem component, or if prompted for other files, try changing the path to the Intel CD.

NOTE: Windows may display a message indicating some VXD files are out of date. To determine if this affects operation of your computer, restart and check the modem. If it will not function, see the MOBILE.TXT file for detailed information.

- 6 For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.
- 7 Restart the computer for the configuration to take effect.
- 8 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

Using Intel PROSet II

PROSet II is an advanced configuration utility designed by Intel. With PROSet II, you can easily see Link and Activity status, test hardware, set advanced adapter features, and set standard features. To install PROSet II, Insert the Intel CD and wait for the Autorun screen to appear. Click Install Advanced Features on the Autorun screen. When the Component Selection screen appears, choose Intel PROSet II and click Install. The installer copies the files needed to your computer.

PROSet II runs when you click the Intel PROSet II icon in the Control panel or the tray icon near your clock on the Windows desktop.

Modem Installation Troubleshooting

Review this section if any of the following problems occur:

- Modem initialization errors occur when attempting to dial-out using a communications application.
- Connection fails or other problems occur.

It may be necessary to define a modem type within your communications application. If the Intel modem is not listed, choose a "Generic Hayes compatible" device.

If your computer is equipped with an infrared communications port, you may need to disable this port. These ports often use COM port resources required for other communications devices. Disable the infrared port both in the computer's CMOS or BIOS setup program and the Windows 95 Device Manager, as follows:

- 1 Some computers use a hardware setup utility to configure the infrared port in the BIOS. See your computer documentation.
- 2 To disable the infrared communications port in Windows 95, go to Device Manager tab under System in the Control Panel.
- 3 Double-click the Ports (COM & LPT) entry and the IR Serial Port entry. Check the Disable in this Hardware Profile option to disable the device.
- 4 You may also need to comment out any "device=" lines containing TRANXIT in the SYSTEM.INI file. Use a semicolon at the beginning of the line to comment out the line.

Use the Modem Diagnostics Tool to verify the computer-tomodem interface.

- 1 In the Modems option in Control Panel, click Diagnostics.
- 2 In Diagnostics properties, highlight the COM port associated with the Intel modem and click the More Info button. This causes Windows 95 and 98 to send commands to and read responses from the modem and display information about the modem and its COM port. The Port Information box should display the following information:
- The IRQ and I/O address of the modem's COM port. These should match the physical configuration of the port or modem adapter.
- Modem responses to various AT commands. The Intel modem may return ERROR for some AT commands that are not supported. This does not indicate a failure.
- 3 The Record a Log File option in the Modems option can also help identify modem problems by recording modem commands and responses in a MODEMLOG.TXT file. To create the MODEM-LOG.TXT file, go to Control Panel, Modems, Properties, Connection, Advanced. In the Advanced Connection Settings window, place a check mark in the Record a log file option box. A MODEMLOG.TXT file will be created in the C:\WINDOWS directory the next time the modem is used.

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Windows 2000 Installation

Note: when you insert the Type II adapter, Windows 2000 detects the controllers on the adapter and automatically installs drivers. Although these drivers provide basic LAN and modem functionality, you should update the drivers as described below. For Type III adapters, no default driver is available. Follow the procedure in the Type III section.

Type II Adapters Only

If you have the LAN-only Mobile adapter, follow steps 1 through 13. If installing the Combo Mobile adapter, follow all steps below.

- 1 On the Windows desktop, right click My Computer.
- 2 Click the Hardware tab.
- 3 Click the Device Manager button.
- 4 Double-click the Network Adapters device. You'll see the Intel adapter listed.
- 5 Right click the Intel adapter and click Properties. On the dialog that appears, click the Driver tab.
- 6 Click the Update driver button. This starts the Upgrade Device Driver Wizard. Click Next to start.
- 7 On the next screen select "Search for a suitable driver" Click Next.
- 8 On the next screen, unclick all boxes except the CD-ROM drives one. Insert the Intel CD and wait until the Autorun screen appears. Close the Autorun screen by clicking the X in the upper right hand corner. Click Next in the wizard.
- 9 The next screen indicates a driver was found. **Be sure to check** the box at the bottom of the screen, called Install one of the other drivers. Click Next to continue.
- 10 The next screen displays a list of drivers. Carefully examine the list. Look in the "Provider" column and select the first driver with Intel as the provider. The location column should indicate this driver is on your CD-ROM drive. Click Next.
- 11 The drivers are copied to your compuer. When the wizard reappears, click Finish.

- 12 Close the Intel adapter Properties dialog by clicking Close.
- 13 If your adapter is a LAN only product you are done. If your adapter is a Combo product, proceed to step 14.
- 14 To update the modem driver, double-click the Modems device in the Device Manager.
- 15 Right click the Intel modem and click Properties. On the dialog that appears, click the Driver tab.
- 16 Repeat steps 6 through 12 above.
- 17 Close the Device Manager, and click OK on the System Properties window to close it.
- 18 Modem users only, Go to Start, Programs, Intel PRO/100 Mobile Adapters.
- 19 Click Intel Country Identifier. The utility scans for modems. After a few moments the country dialog appears.
- 20 Select your country from the pull-down list and click Save and then Exit.

Note: after restarting your computer, you can use Intel PROSet II to configure LAN advanced settings. See Using Intel PROSet II for more information.

Type III Adapters Only

- 1 With computer power on, insert your new adapter as described in Chapter 1.
- 2 Connect the network cable and modem cable if it is a combo card.
- 3 Windows detects the adapter. The Add New Hardware Wizard starts. Follow the prompts in the wizard to install the drivers from the Intel CD.
- 4 Restart your computer when prompted.
- 5 If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify your location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

See the "Installing Intel PROSet II" later in this chapter to install PROSet and other advanced features using the Intel Setup utility.

For most networks, you will need to configure properties for your protocols, computer identification, and preferred servers. Contact your network administrator for details if you need assistance.

Using Intel PROSet II

PROSet II is an advanced configuration utility designed by Intel. With PROSet II, you can easily see Link and Activity status, test hardware, set advanced adapter features, and set standard features. To install PROSet II, Insert the Intel CD and wait for the Autorun screen to appear. Click Install Advanced Features on the Autorun screen. When the Component Selection screen appears, choose Intel PROSet II and click Install. The installer copies the files needed to your computer.

PROSet II runs when you click the Intel PROSet II icon in the Control panel or the tray icon near your clock on the Windows desktop.

Modem Installation Troubleshooting

Review this section if any of the following problems occur:

- Modem initialization errors occur when attempting to dial-out using a communications application.
- Connection fails or other problems occur.

It may be necessary to define a modem type within your communications application. If the Intel modem is not listed, choose a "Generic Hayes compatible" device.

If your computer is equipped with an infrared communications port, you may need to disable this port. These ports often use COM port resources required for other communications devices. Disable the infrared port both in the computer's CMOS or BIOS setup program and the Windows 95 Device Manager, as follows:

- 1 Some computers use a hardware setup utility to configure the infrared port in the BIOS. See your computer documentation.
- 2 To disable the infrared communications port in Windows 95, go to Device Manager tab under System in the Control Panel.
- 3 Double-click the Ports (COM & LPT) entry and the IR Serial Port entry. Check the Disable in this Hardware Profile option to disable the device.
- 4 You may also need to comment out any "device=" lines containing TRANXIT in the SYSTEM.INI file. Use a semicolon at the beginning of the line to comment out the line.

Use the Intel Modem Test utility

To help diagnose modem problems, run the Intel Modem Test Utility. This utility was installed when you installed the Intel adapter. To run the utility, click Start, Programs, Intel Modems, and Modem Test Utility.

Use the Modem Diagnostics Tool to verify the computer-tomodem interface.

- 1 In the Modems option in Control Panel, click Diagnostics.
- 2 In Diagnostics properties, highlight the COM port associated with the Intel modem and click the More Info button. This causes Windows 95 and 98 to send commands to and read responses from the modem and display information about the modem and its COM port. The Port Information box should display the following information:
- The IRQ and I/O address of the modem's COM port. These should match the physical configuration of the port or modem adapter.
- Modem responses to various AT commands. The Intel modem may return ERROR for some AT commands that are not supported. This does not indicate a failure.
- 3 The Record a Log File option in the Modems option can also help identify modem problems by recording modem commands and responses in a MODEMLOG.TXT file. To create the MODEM-LOG.TXT file, go to Control Panel, Modems, Properties, Connection, Advanced. In the Advanced Connection Settings window, place a check mark in the Record a log file option box. A MODEMLOG.TXT file will be created in the C:\WINDOWS directory the next time the modem is used.

Intel Network Encryption Co-Processor

The Intel PRO/100 S Family of Network Adapters includes an Intel 82594ED IPSec encryption co-processor. If Windows 2000 is enabled for IPSec encryption, it automatically offloads the intensive encryption and authentication functions onto the adapter, increasing throughput and decreasing CPU utilization.

Windows NT Installation

The PRO/100 Mobile adapter supports manual installation under Microsoft Windows NT 4.0. When the PRO/100 Mobile adapter is installed, the other PC Card slot is available for use by another PC Card (Type II adapters only).

NOTE: do not install the adapter with the laptop power on unless using CardWizard 4.1 or newer.

Card and Socket Services Software

Some Windows NT 4.0 installations include third-party Card and Socket Services (CSS) software. The PRO/100 Mobile adapters may not operate correctly with Card and Socket Services products (such as CardWare or CardWizard.* See MOBILE.TXT file for details.) If you have a new laptop computer with CSS, try insalling the Mobile adapter with CSS. If this does not work, you may need to remove CSS software prior to installing the PRO/100 Mobile adapter. Use the Add/Remove Software icon in Control Panel to properly remove the CSS software. Then, install the driver by performing the following procedure.

Software Driver Installation

NOTE: if you have not previously installed NT Networking Services, you'll need to do this first. See the section "Installing Windows NT Networking" later in this chapter.

The LAN driver (NDIS4) installs first, followed by the modem driver if you have the Combo adapter.

- 1 Before powering up your mobile computer, insert the PRO/100 Mobile adapter into the CardBus slot, as shown in the Hardware Installation section.
- 2 With the adapter in the CardBus slot, power-up the computer, click Start, click Settings, and select Control Panel. Control Panel opens.
- 3 Double-click the Network icon. The Network Settings window opens.
- 4 Click the Adapters tab. The Network Adapters window opens.
- 5 Click Add. The Select Network Adapter window opens.

- 6 Click Have Disk, insert the Intel CD, and specify the correct path for the CD. Click OK to continue.
- 7 The CardBus Resources window opens, displaying settings for memory and interrupt values (the default interrupt is 10). If you are installing the Combo adapter, a Modem tab also appears. Select values for each setting. A single interrupt is shared for the LAN and modem functions. (If your computer has card and socket services installed the CardBus resources window does not appear; proceed to step 9.)

Note: In most circumstances, the default settings will properly operate the adapter. However, some computers may require changes to the defaults. Usually, only the IRQ setting needs adjustment. See step 11 to verify settings.

- 8 Click OK. The Network Settings window redisplays.
- 9 Click Close. Complete any relevant dialog boxes that appear such as TCP/IP settings. Contact your Network Administrator for help if necessary.
- 10 When the Network Settings Change window opens, click Yes to restart the computer.
- 11 To check the resources chosen in step 7, start PROSet II by double-clicking the Intel PROSet II icon in Control Panel. If there are no conflicts with the LAN settings, you'll see the General tab with adapter status information. If there is a resource conflict with another device, PROSet II displays a Troubleshooting tab with instructions. Follow these instructions to choose different resources. Resources can be changed by clicking the Advanced tab and choosing an interrupt and/or memory value. Close the PROSet II utility and restart when prompted.

Modem Setup (Combo Adapters Only)

- After the computer has restarted, check the NT Event Log for any possible Modem resource issues from step 7 above. You may need to change resources if the log indicates a Modem problem. See step 11 above for changing resources. If no problems are noted, select Modems from Control Panel.
- 2 At the Install New Modem screen make sure that the *Don't detect my modem; I will select it from a list* check box is NOT checked. Click Next. NT will query the COM ports looking for the Intel modem. Once the Intel modem is found, click Next. If a Standard Modem is found, click Change. On the next screen, click Have disk. Type the path to your CD-ROM drive and click OK.

- 3 At the Install New Modem screen, click OK. After confirming that Intel(R) PRO/100 Mobile adapter appears in the dialog box, click Next. Then, click Finish to complete the installation.
- 4 At the Modems Properties screen click Dialing Properties to set up dialing properties (not necessary if a modem had been previously installed). If necessary, change the maximum speed to 115,200. Click Close when done.

If you are not in the U.S. or Canada, run the Country Identifier utility to specify you location. The utility is located in the Intel Mobile program group.

For a complete list and description of modem commands, view the CB2HELP.HLP file on the Intel CD. This is a standard Windows help file. To view it, double-click the file in the Windows Explorer or File Manager.

Installing Windows NT Networking

If your laptop running NT does not have Networking installed, use the following procedure to install Networking and the Intel adapter. With power off, insert the adapter into a CardBus slot. Turn on the power and follow this procedure.

- 1 Select Yes at the "Windows NT Networking is not installed. Do you want to install it now?"
- 2 At the next screen you will tell the system whether you are connecting to the network through the modem or a LAN adapter. Select the appropriate box and click "Next".
- 3 At the "Network Setup Wizard" screen, click "Select from list..."
- 4 From the "Select Network Adapter" screen click "Have Disk.."
- 5 At the "Inset Disk" screen, type the driver letter for the CD-ROM in the box and click OK.
- 6 From the "Select OEM Option" screen highlight the "Intel® PRO Adapter" and click OK.
- 7 The "Network Setup Wizard" screen comes up again, make sure the "Intel PRO Adapter" is highlighted and select "Next".
- 8 The next screen requires you to select the networking protocols your networking environment is using. Select the appropriate box and click Next. If you don't know what Protocol your networking system is using, contact your Network Administrator.

- 9 The next screen shows you the services that will be installed by the system; if you need a service that isn't listed, click "Select from list..." to add the service you need. If you are unsure of what services you need, contact your Network Administrator.
- 10 Click Next on the next screen to install the Networking system.
- 11 The "Windows NT Setup" screen appears next, direct it to the location of the NT files, either on your NT CD or at the I386 directory, usually on root drive of your system.
- 12 The "CardBus Resources" screen appears next. For most installations the default values will work. Check the Mobile.txt file on your Intel CD to see if your computer requires different settings. If you are installing a LAN / Modem combination card, the resource button for the Modem will also be at this screen. Again, most systems will work fine with the default resources. When your resources have been selected, click "OK" to continue.
- 13 If you have selected TCP/IP as one of the protocols, a "TCP/IP Setup" screen appears; if you are going to use DHCP, select "Yes" to continue. If you don't know whether or not you use DHCP, ask your Network Administrator.
- 14 If you select "Yes", continue here. If you selected "No" go to step ...20
- 15 At the next screen you setup the order that your system locates information on the network, you can also disable bindings if you want. When this is done, select "Next"
- 16 At the next screen, select "Next" to complete the Networking installation on your system. Your system will be busy for a couple of minutes installing Networking.
- 17 At the next screen you will need to enter the name of your system and the name of the workgroup or domain of your network. If you don't know this information, ask your Network Administrator. Click "Next" to continue.
- 18 At the next screen click "Finish" to complete the LAN portion of the installation.
- 19 You will need to restart your computer to finish the installation.
- 20 If you said "no" during step 14, you'll be taken to the "Microsoft TCP/IP Properties" screen. Here you will have to set up your IP address information. If you don't know this information, see your Network administrator. Now finish the installation from step 15.

Modem Diagnostics

Use the Intel Modem Test utility

To help diagnose modem problems, run the Intel Modem Test Utility. This utility was installed when you installed the Intel adapter. To run the utility, click Start, Programs, Intel Modems, and Modem Test Utility.

Use the Modem Diagnostics Tool to verify the computer-tomodem interface.

- 1 In the Modems option in Control Panel, click Diagnostics.
- 2 In Diagnostics properties, highlight the COM port associated with the Intel modem and click the More Info button. This causes Windows 95 and 98 to send commands to and read responses from the modem and display information about the modem and its COM port. The Port Information box should display the following information:
- The IRQ and I/O address of the modem's COM port. These should match the physical configuration of the port or modem adapter.
- Modem responses to various AT commands. The Intel modem may return ERROR for some AT commands that are not supported. This does not indicate a failure.
- 3 The Record a Log File option in the Modems option can also help identify modem problems by recording modem commands and responses in a MODEMLOG.TXT file. When you install the PRO/100 Mobile adapter Windows drivers, an advanced configuration utility designed by Intel called PROSet IIproset ii is also installed. With PROSet II, you can easily see Link and Activity status, test hardware, set advanced adapter features, and set standard features with PROSet II.

PROSet II runs when you click the Intel PROSet II icon in the Network Control panel or the tray icon near your clock on the Windows desktop.

Diagnostics and Troubleshooting

This chapter contains supplementary diagnostics and troubleshooting information for the PRO/100 Mobile adapters. For troubleshooting information specific to your operating environment, see the appropriate installation chapter. This supplementary information is intended for users or network administrators who are already familiar with the PRO/ 100 Mobile adapters and documentation, and who have run into difficulties after having completed the appropriate installation and troubleshooting procedures for their

operating environment.

Windows LAN Diagnostics

To run Mobile hardware diagnostics from Windows, run the PROSet II utility.

- 1. Double-click the Intel PROSet II icon in the Control Panel.
- 2. Click the Diagnostics tab.
- 3. Click the Run Tests button. Click Help for details.
- 4. Click Advanced to run a Sender-Responder test.

In addition, you can check the Link and Activity status on the General tab. To monitor driver activity, click the Network Driver tab.

Troubleshooting Checklist

- Review the MOBILE.TXT file on the Installation CD.
- Be sure you have the current drivers for your adapter. You can check the version numbers on the Intel website at **suport.intel.com.**
- Try reinstalling the adapter drivers. Remove installed drivers first. For Windows 98/95, use Add/Remove Programs in Control Panel. For Windows NT, remove the LAN portion by running Network in Control Panel and the modem portion by running Modems in the Control Panel.
- When loading drivers or running the test utility, keep the LAN adapter cable attached to the Mobile adapter.
- Under Novell, ensure that the FRAME TYPE you are using is the same as that of the file server. The server frame type should be specified as the first frame type in the NET.CFG.
- In a twisted pair environment, try plugging directly into the hub or concentrator.
- Plug in to a known working network connection.
- Try using the PRO/100 Mobile adapter on a different computer.
- Try another PRO/100 Mobile adapter if available.
- Try forcing the speed and duplex settings on the adapter.
- If your computer has multiple PC Card sockets, move the adapter to another socket.
- If you have more than one PC Card device in your computer, remove the non-Intel PC Card devices.
- Test the PRO/100 Mobile adapter without loading Card and Socket Services to prevent conflicts between the Intel adapter and Card and Socket Services.
- Make sure that the PRO/100 Mobile adapter interrupt, memory address, and I/O address do not conflict with other installed hardware (such as sounds cards, CD-ROM drives and PEN devices).
- Try loading the Mobile drivers at different memory locations (i.e.: C8000, CC000, D4000, D8000, E2000).
- Try using different interrupt values (i.e.: 3, 10, 11).
- Try using different port addresses (i.e.: 280, 290, 310, 320).

- In Windows 95, change autodetect to specific frame type.
- In NT (mostly), change the interrupt settings if you experience steady on/off blinking of link light on cable connector, or if you experience sporadic mouse movement.

Changing Driver Parameters

For Windows installations, use PROSet II to modify driver parameters such as network speed, duplex, and other advanced settings. In most cases the default settings for these parameters are best and do not need changing.

For Novell installations, see the NETWARE.TXT file on the Intel CD.
